Origins and growth, sieges and glory days

In the old heart of the town, you're taken back hundreds of years.



The cobbled streets lined with 17th and 18th century houses, narrow alleyways and impressive monuments recreate a bygone era. Each tells a part of the Grave's rich and turbulent history.

Castle on the river

In the 12th century, the lords of Cuijk built a castle at the mouth of the river Raam, the only spot on the banks of the Maas in the Land of Cuijk offering suitable moorings. A settlement grew around the castle, and Grave was born.





Seven sieges

In de 13th century, Grave was granted city rights. In the centuries that followed, the town experienced no fewer than seven heavy sieges, including occupation and destruction by the Spanish and the French. But as the Grave anthem proudly declares: "Time after time, our brave little town re-emerged in freedom."

Together with 10 other fortified towns, Grave is part of the important Dutch defences known as the Southern

Waterline: the oldest, longest and most utilised waterline in the Netherlands.



Ideal trade route

From the middle ages, Grave grew into a prosperous trading town. This is reflected in many of the town's historic monuments. The Maas is still an important trade route, as well as a beautiful tourist spot.





Monuments in Grave 9 top tips

Saint Elisabeth's Church [1]



Saint Elisabeth's Catholic church dates back to 1250. Much has changed of the original construction. Nevertheless, 'the Elisabeth', as she is fondly referred to by locals, is still an important feature of the picturesque fortified town. The lofty nave and beautifully carved pulpit are stunning. And be sure to look up at the impressive Smits organ. For more information (in Dutch), see st-elisabethkerk.nl

Maaspoort (Maas Gate)

For centuries, many a captain would moor his vessel here, to trade grain, salt, coal, cheese, wine, herring, slate and other valuable cargo. The Maaspoort was their gateway to the fortified town. Today, it provides the backdrop for various water-front events, including the arrival of Sint Nicolas by steamboat in mid-November each year.

Belfort (Bell tower) (4)

The Belfort in the heart of the town was built in the functional, post-war Bossche School style. This old bell tower will take on a new role as a watch tower, giving visitors stunning views over the historic rooftops of Grave, the river Maas and its floodplains.



Arsenaal (7)

This impressive complex was once partly used as a coach house for the castle. When this was destroyed during the siege of Grave in 1674, the ground was raised to create artillery positions. From the top of the mound, 'the Kat', take in the fabulous views over the town and surrounding countryside to the spires of Old Velp.



Old Velp: monasteries & small church (8)

Old Town Hall (5)



The first Grave town hall was built on this spot in the 13th century. The historic building has been restored to its 1730 state, and is, not-surprisingly, a popular venue for marriage ceremonies. This is also where you'll find Tourist Information Grave and the Southern Water Line visitor's

Cycle or walk past the Kazematten and Sasse pumping station along the dyke to Old Velp. The three church towers are prominent on the horizon, inviting visitors to the former monasteries of the Redemptoristine nuns, and Franciscan monks. The small Vincentius church is now an arts centre. Hampoort (Ham Gate)

This Unesco monument from 1688 is part of the original fortifications. It is now home to the guild of the town guard musket bearers as well as the Graafs Museum. The permanent exhibition 'A Window onto the Graafs Heritage' takes you back in time through the history of Grave: from the stone age to present day. There are also changing exhibits. Casemate bunkers [9]

Constructed in 1936 to protect the Grave bridge, these military bunkers still have the same extensive view as then. The importance of the simple yet highly effective structures during Operation Market Garden and the liberation of Grave is undisputed. They are now a museum well-worth visiting. For
